With reference to your request for information received on 19th January 2024, I can confirm in accordance with Section 1 (1) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 that we do hold the information you have requested. A response to each part of your request is provided below. Please accept our sincere apologies for the delay.

In your request you asked:

1. How many amputations took place due to medical errors between January 2020now?

By 'medical errors' I refer to; Delayed treatment of an infection, Failure to recognise that the blood supply has been cut off to a limb, Poor management of peripheral neuropathy in diabetic patients, A surgeon operating on the wrong body part, Deep vein thrombosis (DVT) or a delay in diagnosis of a DVT, Incorrect treatment of fractures causing tissue damage, negligently performed joint replacement surgery.

Can this information be broken down by year, up to and include any data held for January 2024.

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If the number is very low (less than 5) the information cannot be disclosed as it could potentially identify the individuals involved, especially if combined with other data and this would constitute a breach of the UK GDPR 2018.

Therefore, this information is exempt from disclosure under section 40(2) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 on the grounds that it is personal information.

Section 40 (2)

We are not obliged, under section 40(2) of the Act, to provide information that is the personal data of another person if releasing would contravene any of the provisions of UK GDPR. In this instance we believe that the release of this information, would not be fair and contravene the first data protection principle and therefore section 40 (2) is engaged.

Home, Community, Hospital.



The terms of this exemption in the Freedom of Information Act mean that we do not have to consider whether or not it would be in the public interest for you to have the information.
