



INFORMATION FOR PATIENTS

Video fluoroscopy

You have been referred by the Speech and Language Therapy department because you have had some difficulties swallowing. The speech and language therapists are trained to assess and treat swallowing problems. The x-ray will give us information about your swallowing difficulties, what might be causing them and how we can improve them where possible.

How long will it take?

The procedure takes approximately 20 minutes.

Can I eat and drink before the examination?

Yes (providing you are not already nil by mouth).

If there are particular foods or drinks you would like us to test you on, for example you find them difficult to swallow, please bring small amounts of these with you.

What should you expect?

The x-ray does not hurt. You will sit on a chair and the machine will be brought down close to your left side.

You will be given small amounts of food and/or fluids mixed with a white powder called barium. You will be given different consistencies of food and fluids to try.

You may be asked to try different head positions such as putting your head down towards your chest while you are swallowing. This may help you swallow more safely.

Who will be there?

A radiographer will work the x-ray machine.

A speech and language therapist will advise what consistencies of foods and/or fluids to trial you with and any strategies (for example head movements) to try.

Is it harmful?

Video fluoroscopy, like any x-ray examination, uses ionising radiation, which can be harmful to you. The minimum amount of x-rays possible will be used to minimise the risk. You will only have the examination if the whole team looking after you think that the benefits will outweigh the risks.

Some of the barium may get into your lungs if your swallowing is not working properly. Most people have no difficulty coping with the small amounts that may enter their lungs. Others may need physiotherapy to help get rid of it.

What happens afterwards?

You will receive some information about your swallowing straight away. You may be able to view the examination to help you understand the information in more detail.

A DVD of the procedure will be made and analysed by the speech and language therapist. A report will be produced using the findings and sent to your doctor and a copy will be sent to you. Your regular speech and language therapist will review your swallowing where appropriate at a later date.
