# Having a barium swallow/meal

Your doctor has advised you to have a barium swallow/meal. This leaflet aims to explain what will happen and answer frequently asked questions.

This examination usually takes place in the morning. We will ask you to drink a white chalky fluid containing barium sulphate, which coats the oesophagus and stomach so as to show them on x-ray images. We may also give you fizzy ingredients to create gas in the stomach.

We obtain some or all of our images with you in a standing or sitting position. Depending on the question your doctor has asked, we may also need to obtain images with you lying horizontally.

The duration of the examination varies but in most cases it takes no longer than 10-15 minutes.

#### Before the examination

Your stomach needs to be empty for us to obtain the best results, so we ask you not to eat or drink for the four hours immediately before your appointment.

We will usually ask you to change into a hospital gown, although this is not always necessary.

Please leave any valuables at home. You are responsible for all personal items you bring into the hospital and the Trust cannot accept responsibility for their loss or damage.

#### After the examination

You may eat and drink normally. The barium is not absorbed by the body and makes its way out through the bowel over the next few days, so you might notice a whiter stool than normal.

### If you have diabetes

We can usually arrange an appointment early in the day if you let us know. Usual advice is **not** to take your morning insulin or diabetic tablets (such as metformin) but to bring them with you to take after the examination. Please bring something to eat if you need it. You may also wish to seek advice from the person who usually looks after your diabetes.

#### **lonising radiation**

This examination involves x-rays. We minimise your dose of x-rays so that the benefits of the examination outweigh the risks.

#### Results

The radiologist will study the images and will send a report to the hospital team (or GP) that requested the examination.
