#### **Executive Summary**

Annually the Trust must submit to NHS England a self-assessment of its Emergency Preparedness, Resilience and Response (EPRR) arrangements by rating itself against the Core Standards, which are designed around the six legal obligations the Trust must comply with under the Civil Contingencies Act (2004).

The submission will create one of four possible compliance ratings; Full Compliance Substantial Compliance Partial Compliance Not Compliant

The process is led by the Trust's Emergency Planning Officer with oversight by the Resilience Assurance Committee.

There are 64 sub-sections to the Core Standards split between ten main headings: Governance Duty To Risk Assess

Training & Exercising
Response
Warning & Informing
Cooperation
Business Continuity
CBRN (Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear)

The self-assessment is then subject to a "confirm and challenge" by senior NHSE/I and CCG EPRR staff who issue a formal letter confirming our level of compliance.

This year, apart from not meeting the criteria on the Business Continuity Management System (BCMS) in just three areas, the Trust was fully compliant. This means we received a rating of "Substantially Compliant", which is the same rating as last year, but with fewer non-compliant areas.

This is a positive reflection of the engagement and work done at Divisional level and the oversight applied by the Trust's Resilience Assurance Committee.

The Trusts Emergency Planning Officer will continue to develop the BCMS so that the Trust can achieve a full compliance rating in the near future.

It should be stressed however, that a recent 360 Assurance audit into our BCMS concluded that it provided "Significant Assurance".

A key Governance requirement is that the Trust's annual compliance rating is submitted to the Board for assurance.
