Supracondylar fracture

What is a supracondylar fracture?

Your child has a fracture just above the elbow.

This type of fracture is one of the most common fractures in children. It occurs at the elbow in the lower end of the upper arm, usually from falling onto an outstretched hand.

Your child's arm will be placed into a temporary plaster cast, supported by a collar and cuff sling.

Swelling and bruising at the fracture site is normal. Simple, overthe-counter pain killers and applying ice to the area will help to reduce swelling and pain.

You should:

- Give simple over-the-counter pain relief as needed.
- Encourage your child to keep wiggling their fingers to prevent stiffness.

You should not:

- Stick anything down the cast.
- Miss your child's appointment with the consultant.

At your child's appointment, their elbow will be x-rayed again to check the position of the fracture.

The consultant will then discuss further options for managing your child's injury at this appointment.

Problems and further advice

A fracture liaison service is available, and advice can be given over the telephone.
